Several antique vehicles nationwide take part in five-day tour

MEDINA — More than 35 vintage cars from several states filled the Castle Noel parking lot Tuesday morning, as people took part in the Vintage Motor Car Club of America's Rolling Down the Back Roads of Rural Medina five-day tour.

The Vintage Motor Car Club of Amer-

ica was established in 1938 to promote touring and the enjoyment of vintage vehicles by acquiring, preserving and exhibiting vintage and historically significant vehicles.

According to the Vintage Motor Car Club of America, the organization's specialty is taking part in touring events throughout the country.

Debbie Vasel of Valley City recently

ica was established in 1938 to promote volunteered to host a tour in Medina touring and the enjoyment of vintage County and surrounding areas.

"(It's) to bring people to the area so that they can enjoy everything around here and see what's around," Vasel said.

Throughout the five days, participants will travel within 60 miles of Wadsworth to visit museums, private car collections, businesses and more.

On Tuesday, the group started the day at Castle Noel before traveling to other places like the Little Wiz Fire Museum, Sweets & Geeks, the McDowell-Phillips House Museum and Root Candle.

"(It's) just places of interest that I thought the people would like," Vasel said. "Some of them have to do with old cars and then we have a few kids that come on the tour. So you try to have stuff for the men, the women and kids, not just all old car stuff."

Vintage Motor Car Club of America tours welcome original preserved or restored cars 25 years or older, but some events may be restricted to specific car types or eras like the tour currently going through Medina.

According to the tour's application, participating vehicles must be a one-cylinder car, a two-cylinder car, a steam car or electric cars built in or before 1915. The tour also welcomed four-cylinder cars of 10 horsepower or

less built in or before 1904.

Gil Fitzhugh of New Jersey has taken part in tours for the past 25 years, traveling throughout the United States and Canada.

He currently has five vintage cars, including a 1907 Cadillac, which he brought to Medina.

"They are the simple, early cars," Fitzhugh said, as he talked with visitors about the vehicles taking part in the tour.

Tim Jackson of Fort Wayne, Indiana, bought his 1908 Northern in 1997 and began participating in Vintage Motor Car Club of America tours with the car shortly after.

Throughout the years, he has taken part in tours of all sizes, including three-day tours in a set area to traveling hundreds of miles on a set route. Jackson said it all depends on what he believes would be worth the trip.

As he takes part in more tours around the Midwest, Jackson said he often sees people he's toured with before, along with new faces. "It's like a family reunion," he said.

Jay Leno has a regular column in the Hagerty Drivers Club magazine. Jay's column in the July - August editions made me chuckle.


TWO GUYS CALLED ME UP a few years ago and said they were going to drive an antique car across America and then write a book about it. They wanted to know if they could stop by the garage and get a picture. I said sure, no problem. Then I asked them what kind of car they were driving. The one guy said, "a 1968 Cadillac." It just made

me laugh because they thought that was an antique car. Maybe I am the antique, but if you've got air conditioning, an AM/FM radio, power windows, power brakes, and modern tires, are you really putting it on the line? I ended up writing the foward for the book, and I said, "They are attempting something Americans did on a regular basis 50 years ago."

Many of the Vintage, Antique, or Marque car clubs today have an eligiblity of 25 years old or older. Think about this, cars built in 2000 will soon be eligible in those clubs. We must also think about, will they be welcomed in those clubs? That question can be a topic for another discussion.

The view from my side of the road today is about the 1 & 2 Cylinder Tour featured in the article above. Each year a group of VMCCA members plan and host a tour for 1 & 2 Cylinder cars. The tour is not an across America tour. It is usually a tour "homed or hubbed" in a small town with drives out a distance to venues and attractions. Jay asked if the the 1968 Cadillac drivers were really putting it on the line. From my view, our 1 & 2 Cylinder drivers actually do put it on the line. It is a bit like Humpty Dumpty. If it breaks, can all the participants put it back together again? Of course, they will try and most likely succeed. One of the reasons is pointed out by Tim Jackson in the article, "It's like a family reunion." The bond formed with participants touring in vintage and antique cars is like a family. Every possible effort will be made to fix something broken while on the road. Hotel parking lots often have members helping other members fix something. Why? We are family, we are putting it on the line, and we are doing this antique car thing together. The 1 & 2 Cylinder group would get a standing ovation from Jay. He might need to write a different forward to the story, "They are attempting something Americans did on a regular basis **100** years ago."





The 1968 Plymouth Road Runner was a Very Popular Muscle Car

The popular 1968 Plymouth Road Runner was designed under the direction of Elwood P. Engel, who followed in the footsteps of the legendary designer Virgil Exner leading the Chrysler design studio. Engel left the Ford Motor Company design team and came to Chrysler with a great passion for automotive style. One popular design concept that Engel was a part of was the 1963 Chrysler Turbine car that many thoroughly enjoyed. Another great looking car Engel turned out toward the end of his career was the 1968 Road Runner coupe, which was priced at \$3,034. A total of 15,359 units were produced that year.

The Road Runner was a high-performance car named for the famed animated cartoon bird character. According to automotive historians, Chrysler's Plymouth marketing division paid Warner Brothers studio \$50,000 for the licensing of the name, which included the iconic "Beep Beep" horn sound recognized and beloved by Road Runner fans. The late Jack Smith of Chrysler worked with Warner Brothers to use the animated bird for the popular Plymouth car, however, it was Gordon Cherry who came up with the idea of using the Road Runner

cartoon bird in conjunction with the vehicle. The resulting marketing campaign was very effective in 1968.


Continue Reading Nuts and Notes, July 2024

The two images below of the front and back of a post card are from the VMCCA archive. I recently received a file folder filled with interesting artifacts from 1945 - 1946. It appears to be a folder kept by Dean Fales. Mr. Fales was the first President of the VMCCA and also served as President in 1945. Dean Fales was a Professor at M.I.T. Most mail addresss to him were addressed to Prof. Dean A. Fales. It is my intent to feature something from the folder from time to time. This edition features an unused post card dipicting the birthplace of the Automobile Industry and the many "first" of the

Duryea Motor Wagon.

The article below the postcard was written by A. Wayne Ferens 12/02/2020. The author points out that the Duryea brothers first road tested their motor wagon on September 20, 1893. The post card indicates that patent #540648 granted on June 11, 1895 is the first patent of all other U. S. automobile makers.

Also in Professor Fales file folder is the same post card sent to him by M.J. Duryea post marked Apr 19, 1942. Mr. Duryea is informing and celebrating "86 million vehicles in the first 50 years."



The Duryea Motor Wagon Co. of Springfield was first
U. S. motor car corp. Sept. 21, 1895. Duryea Cars won
America's first auto race, Chicago Nov. 28, 1895, America's second race, New York May 30, 1896, and England's first
race, London to Brighton Nov. 14, 1896. At the world's
first track race, Providence Sept. 1896, they took all prizes
for gasoline cars. A three-cylinder Duryea won the first
E. Buryea June 11, 1895 antedated the first patents
of all other U. S. automobile makers. Barnum's Circus in
1896 featured the Duryea car on billboard, in ring and
parade.

Charles E. (1861-1938) and J. Frank Duryea (1869-1967) were born in Canton, Illinois and became known as the "Bicycle Brothers" for making their own bicycles and inventing bicycle improvements at their shop in Washington, D.C. towards the end of the 19th century. By the early 1890s, they were headquartered in Springfield, Massachusetts and became interested in new gasoline engines and self-powered wagons. The brothers purchased a used horse drawn wagon for \$70 and installed their first single cylinder four-horsepower free-piston gasoline engine that Frank built at their shop on 47 Taylor Street. After the buggy was fitted with a friction transmission, low tension ignition and a spray-type carburetor, the brothers, with Charles at the tiller, road tested the first-ever, working American-made gasoline-powered automobile on September 20, 1893.

The first motor vehicle race in America was held in Chicago in 1895 and was sponsored by H. H. Kohlsaat, owner of the Chicago Times-Herald. The contest was being held "with a view of stimulating invention and rousing an interest" in this new form of transportation. It drew 70 entrees. Kohlsaat also offered a \$500 prize for anyone who came up with a proper name for this horseless carriage. Thousands of suggestions were sent to the Times-Herald, and the prize was divided among three people who proposed the word "motocycle." Kohlsaat began publishing the first auto trade journal, entitled The Motocycle Maker and Dealer, later that same year. The name "motocycle" never caught on with Americans, but eventually the word "automobile" did. In January 1899, the New York Times was the first publication to use the word "automobile" in an editorial,

criticizing it as a mixture of Greek and Latin origin.



Here is Randy introduction to the video




