VMCCA Veterans Take Notice

A new, free, lifetime pass to more than 2,000 federal recreation areas, including all National Parks is now available to all veterans of the US Armed Services and Gold Star Families.

Congress recently passed legislation authorizing a free lifetime pass to national parks and other federal recreation areas for eligible U.S. military veterans and Gold Star families.

These passes are available at all National Parks that charge an entrance fee. There are a number of documents you can use as proof of service which include:

- Department of Defense Identification Card
- Veteran Health Identification Card (VHIC)
- Veteran ID Card
- Veterans' designation on a state-issued U.S. driver's license or identification card

Another Reason to Attend VMCCA Tours

Recently my wife, Linda, and I attended the Mid-Atlantic Annual meeting in Strasburg, PA. While we were there, we stopped by two cemeteries where some of my ancestors are buried and where a monument is erected commemorating the early settlers in Paradise, PA.

I came to realize, after having attended several VMCCA tours in the Eastern United States, it seems like each one we go on, there is some family history on either my side or Linda's associated within the general location of the tour.

June 2018 found us attending the Heritage tour in Westport, Massachusetts. On the drive to the tour, we stopped in Goose Creek, Virginia and visited the Quaker Meeting House where two of Linda's ultra-great relations lived. Jasper Seybold (1730-1788) worshipped at this church, and this was where his son, Jesse, was kicked out of the Quaker church for stealing watermelons. The original log meeting house was built in 1750, was replaced on the same site in 1765 and with a newer, meeting house built in 1817. The 1765 meeting house is a onestory stone building and was converted to a residence after the construction of the 1817 meeting house.

While on the 2019 Heritage tour in Fairborn (Dayton), Ohio we stopped at the site of the Battle of Piqua, fought in 1780. This battle site and museum along the Mad River is just outside the George Rogers Clark Park. The battle in which Osias Welch(another of Linda's ancestors) was in was fought between the Kentucky County militia under General George Rogers Clark and Shawnee Indians under Chief Black Hoof.

Again in 2019, Linda and I were on the prowl for ancestors. The Grand Indiana tour was in August, and we made an optional side tour to the property of Jesse Sebold (1762 1842). Yup, this is the same Jesse that was kicked out of the Quaker church. He lived in Washington County, KY until 1830 when he moved to Illinois. Perhaps there will be a VMCCA tour there I'll catch up to him.

The Branson, Missouri convertible tour in October 2021 brought us near my grandfather's (Vard Worstell b. 1886) birthplace. Because his family only rented property, there are no land records, so we were not able to locate the exact place. We do know that they picked up their mail in Newburgh, Missouri, whose population in 2010 was 470.

Finding the gravesite of an ultra-great grandfather of mine, Joseph Worstell (1717-1850) was our assignment on the July 2022 Great Lakes Region tour. Joseph was an Ohio pioneer, living there before 1800. We had a description of the location of the gravesite in a Bethel, Ohio cemetery and had a fifteen-year-old picture of the headstone, but, alas, we were not able to find the marker. I'm sure that as we paced around the cemetery, we walked on poor Joseph's body.

Marie Ferree and her children were French Huguenots and came to what is now Paradise, Pennsylvania in 1712 after fleeing France. They were fortunate enough to receive a land grant from William Penn and thus were some of the first European settlers in Lancaster County.

Well, as you can see, I have found another reason to go on VMCCA tours. Perhaps, and maybe even probably, I would never have visited these homesteads and final resting places were it not for Linda's interest in genealogy. So, get your family history stories out of the attic, dust them off and make your own personal, optional tour while attending a scheduled VMCCA tour. Take some time to visit these burial spots and homesteads. I bet you will enjoy the time as much as I do.

Steve Cockerham's Ford Pickup, update.

Most every vehicle repair project comes with at least one suprise. Vintage car projects generally come with multiple suprises. Steve's engine rebuild came with an issue that might have been expected. Flathead engines frequently will have cracks in the areas



between the valves and the cylinders. Steve wisely sent his block out for cleaning and magnaflux. The photos Steve sent are typical of what are found.

Now what? There are, or maybe were, machine shops who could weld these cracks. Another solution would be to find a replacement block. Ford Motor Company stopped supplying them through their parts business decades ago. Typically, junk yards or recyclers crushed all of the flathead powered cars in about the same time frame. Again, now what?

Between my brother and myself we have a few blocks in our parts inventory. None of mine are

known good builders. My brother's one remaining known good block is a fully rebuilt race engine. While it might be for sale, it is expensive. If any of our readers know of a known good block, Steve would appreciate a call.



Looking back: Rearview cameras have been around longer than you think

While we always enjoy gazing in rearview at automotive history, today we're doing it in a more literal sense. Backup cameras, which are also referred to as reverse cameras and rearview cameras, have been a required safety feature in all new American-made cars since May 1, 2018. That means the technology is relatively new, right? Wrong. It's been around for decades.

The 1956 Buick Centurion concept car, unveiled at the General Motors Motorama in January 1956, was the first vehicle to feature a reverse camera that allowed its driver to see behind the car without having to physically turn around and look backward. Designers were so confident in the rearview camera that there were no mirrors on the car. The Centurion also featured a bubble roof and cockpit, offering unobstructed views all around.

The shapely concept car's backup system was bulkier and more conspicuous than modern stealthy versions—a large TV camera lens was mounted in the rear and a screen was located on the dash—but it was definitely cutting-edge technology. Except that it didn't catch on for years, not even at Buick.

The Old Spanish Trail - Part 1 June 4 through June 10, 2023 Santa Fe NM to Grand Junction, CO

The Old Spanish Trail had several variations. We shall follow the North Branch of the Northern Route as experienced by Fathers Dominguez and Escalante in 1776. The eight trails were used to connect the Old Town of Santa Fe in New Spain to the missions in California. The trail chosen was dependent upon weather, water and other conditions at the time. The western journey took woolen goods made in and around Santa Fe and Taos to exchange for horses and mules in California. There was also trade with native Americans along



the way. The journey took about three months going west and about half that coming back. The fathers created the north branch follow existing Native American trails. None of the trails ever developed into wagon roads during the time the land was still part of New Spain or later Mexico. This trade route was responsible for the development of the Santa Fe Trail bringing goods for the east after Mexico became independent and Spanish restrictions ended.

Our tour will take us into Taos where the Pueblo was occupied for over many centuries is still occupied. We will then cross the Rio Grande several times as we journey North through several Tribal territories and Colorado's oldest town of San Luis. We will see Ft. Garland once commanded by Kit Carson near the college town of Alamosa. We then travel by the easy route over Cochetopa Pass to Gunnison with its extensive Pioneer Museum. Then it is on to Montrose and its Museum of the West and the Ute Indian Museum via the black Canyon National Park. On our final leg of this Part One of the Old Spanish Trail, we shall stop at the re-created Ft. Uncompany originally established in 1825. We will close out part one with a tour over the Colorado National Monument before our closing banguet in Grand Junction.

The day after our closing, many of us will travel back to Santa Fe to retrieve our trailers and tow vehicles. We will go through Ouray, referred to as the Switzerland of America. and then over Red Mountain Pass to Silverton and on through Durango. Our trouble truck will cover the journey.

We will travel through some beautiful country as well as much of the poverty stricken areas typical of the southwest. We will go from high desert to high mountains and back to high desert.

Dear Sir :---

We're writing this letter to you today because we want to help you get your money out of your Model T. It's still as good a car as it was the day the new Model A Ford was announced and there's no need to sacrifice it. The Model T Ford is still used by more people than any other automobile.


Eight million are in active service right now and many of them can be driven one, two, three and five years and even longer.

Bring your car to us and let us look it over. You'll be surprised to see how little it costs to put it in tip-top shape.

New fenders, for instance, cost from \$3.50 to \$5.00 each, with a labor charge of \$1.00 to \$2.50. Tuning up the motor and replacing commutator case, brush and vibrator points costs only \$1.00, with a small charge for material. Brake shoes can be installed and emergency brakes equalized for a labor charge of only \$1.25. A labor charge of \$4.00 to \$5.00 will cover the overhauling of the front axle, rebushing springs and spring perches, and straightening, aligning and adjusting wheels. The labor charge for overhauling the average rear axle runs from \$5.75 to

\$7.00. Grinding valves and cleaning carbon can be done for \$3.00 to \$4.00. A set of four new pistons and rings cost only \$7.00. For a labor charge of \$20 to \$25.00 you can have your motor and transmission completely overhauled. Parts are extra.







How the Dodge Main Assembly Plant Became World-Class


