On Tuesday morning we traveled to Fremont, Ohio, to the Rutherford B. Hayes Presidential Library and Museum. The stunning home contains periodcorrect furniture from when President Hayes lived there. Most of the pieces are original to the house. Fantastic! The VMCCA Toledo Chapter served coffee and donuts in the museum's meeting room. Then we drove country roads to the Schedel Gardens in Elmore, Ohio. This was originally a private home with an arboretum garden. We were able to walk the gardens or ride golf carts with a docent driving and explaining the names of trees and flowers. We ate lunch in the garden's conference room. It was a perfect space to visit and enjoy lunch. Afterward, our next stop was to Packer Creek Pottery in Genoa, Ohio. We were gathered in their workshop and watched as master potters threw various pieces of pottery into shape. We also observed gifted potters inscribe and pinstripe custom-made pottery. Thursday's weather forecast was for severe storms and wind. Our reservations for the trip to Put-In-Bay were canceled as the Jet Express boats were not heading into Lake Erie. Our hosts reworked the day's tour, and we went to Port Clinton to the Liberty Aviation Museum. They have many restored planes in their museum. A restored Ford Trimotor flies on a regular schedule. They had a nice lunch area where we dined in a replica of a trolley car. Our next stop was at the Glass Pavilion in Toledo. We arrived in time to watch artists demonstrate glass blowing. And we saw many glass collections in the museum's rooms before heading back to Rossford for the evening.

Friday morning was our last day. We visited the Millbury Classic Cars and Trucks Museum in Millbury, Ohio. The museum opened in 2015 and has expanded dramatically over the past 10 years. The collection has original and show-worthy restored cars on display. We had our closing banquet there at noon.
